- Decide if your essay will emphasize the differences or similarities

**Similarities to Differences Strategy:** Intro, Similarities, Differences, Conclusion

**Differences to Similarities:** Intro, Differences, Similarities, Conclusion

**The Introduction** has 3 parts:

- **Hook:** an attention grabbing open
  - **Bridge:** a statement connecting the hook to the thesis
  - **Thesis:** the argument your paper advances
- 

**Strategies for the Hook Include:**

- **Shocking** the reader with a statistic
  - **Telling** an interesting story
  - **Analogizing** by making a useful comparison
  - **Misdirecting** the reader by suggesting another topic
  - **Personalizing** by telling an anecdote about yourself or experiences

**The Bridge Connects the hook to the Thesis Statement**

**Thesis Statement in a Compare Contrast Essay**

- Should be **a one sentence** claim that previews the arguments you will make in your essay.
  - It should tell the reader whether you believe the similarities or differences are more important
  - It should specifically identify any major claims you intend to make in the piece.

**Sample Thesis Statements:**

**Bad:** Christianity and Islam were similar in some ways but different in others.

**Better:** Christianity and Islam were similar in origin but different in practice.

**Best:** While both Christianity and Islam are Abrahamic faiths rooted in belief in one god, their differences in practice and faith make them profoundly different faiths.
